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### HOW TO MAKE GOOD CITIZENS

Discuss what you are reading to get more information about candidates. Tell the children how you make up your mind. Wear your "I voted" stickers proudly and then display them on your bulletin board.

My daughter asked my 6-year-old grandson if he wanted to go with her when she want to vote for the governor. He asked her to wait a minute and ran upstairs to put on his blazer jacket and clip-on tie. !Why did you get dressed up, Jeremy? !If I'm going to meet the governor, I want to look nice. My daughter explained there would be booths and voting machines, but no governor. Jeremy said, !I'm going to keep my jacket on anyway. Even if the governor won't be there, it's pretty important.
